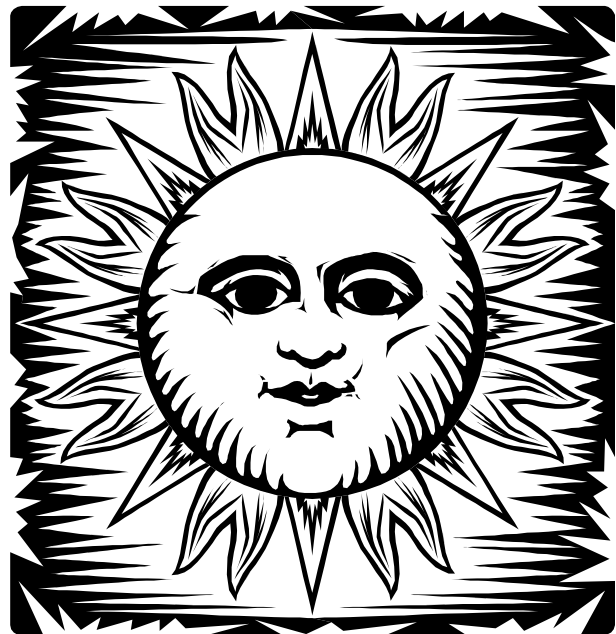
BHNA ANNUAL MEETING

CREATE THE BEST OF BOTH WORLDS

Many people find that attracting birds, butterflies, and other animals makes for a more peaceful and pleasant backyard. The great thing is that you can create a backyard that is appealing to wildlife and humans without too much fuss.

The National Wildlife Federation (NWF) has a program known as Backyard Wildlife Habitat to help you. (Their website www.nwf.org/backyard guides you through the process.) As you create your habitat, you can submit an application and get your yard certified as one of tens of thousands of official NWF Backyard Wildlife Habitats.

Once certified, your yard will be designated as part of the NWF's national registry of habitat sites and you will receive a certificate suitable for framing. You may also choose to receive an attractive yard sign for display in your habitat. When you certify your yard or garden, you automatically become a member of NWF with full membership benefits, including a year's subscription to the award winning *National Wildlife* magazine. The basic cost is \$15.

IT CAN BE DONE!

Betton Hills residents Kelly, Laurie, and Danielle Dozier have a NWF Backyard Habitat at their home on East Randolph Circle (look for the NWF sign). Kelly reports that going through the certification was educational and confirmed her belief that it is possible to have a yard that is attractive and safe for wildlife while being pleasing for her family.

Kelly says there are four basic steps to create the habitat:

1. Grow food. While birdfeeders help, it's best to grow plants that produce food for wildlife. Kelly

uses a mix of native and cultivated flowers to attract hummingbirds, butterflies, and bees. Her yard had plenty of seed and fruit-bearing trees along the border, including pines, wild cherry, and cherry laurel.

2. Give water. "With the drought this year, our water spots really bring in the wildlife," says Kelly.

"This year we've even had foxes and raccoons visit the pond and plenty of birds at the baths."

3. Give cover and shelter. Along the borders, Kelly has filled in beneath the trees with a variety of shrubs. This gives cover for lots of wildlife, especially birds, as well as nesting places.

4. Garden in an environmentally friendly way. Kelly says

the family likes to play outside games so they wanted to keep a fair amount of grass. Even so, she uses an organic fertilizer (sparingly) and spot kills problem weeds. She uses leaves from her trees as mulch in the flowerbeds, covering that with pine needles for a nice look. There's a compost bin in a back corner for yard debris and to create good garden soil. To save water she installed a drip irrigation system. As a special feature to keep rainwater on site, Kelly created a water garden by sloping the yard to create a low area. In that, she planted a cypress and hydrangeas.

In sum, Kelly feels the yard works great for her family, works for wildlife, and helps protect the soil, water, and air quality of the neighborhood. "This is exactly what I was hoping for in my yard," Kelly says, "it's great!"
