## Neighborhood Beautification is the Goal of the Carol Bellamy Fund

Your donations to the Carol Bellamy Fund enable volunteers to plant trees and shrubs in our neighborhood parks and islands and to provide benches in parks. The fund may be used for anything that promotes beauty in our neighborhood. This year we provided funds to the City of Tallahassee to continue planting flowers in McCord Park.

On Arbor Day 2009, a group of neighbors planted a variety of trees in McCord Park including a long-leaf pine, two more blueberry bushes, and a native plum tree. The City of Tallahassee Parks Department provided 15 bales of straw, which we used to mulch past plantings. This really helps in the long term care of trees and shrubs by preventing damage from weed whackers. All plantings have done well this year due to ample amounts of rainfall. Watch for blueberries in the summer and eventual satsumas in the winter.

This year, our group also thinned the pines that had grown up along the southern edge of McCord Park. The Arbor Day group cleaned out the bluebird house, wood duck nest boxes and purple martin gourds. Please help yourself to compost from the large compost bin that was built during Arbor Day 2007; it is on the Armistead Road side of McCord Park.

The Bellamy Fund also supports the planting and maintenance of islands and traffic calming devices in the neighborhood. These islands could be eye sores, but due to the work of several neighbors, they are pleasant and beautiful accents in our neighborhood. Unfortunately, the Betton island plantings were destroyed by road construction; we are waiting for cooler weather to replant this island.

Potential projects for this year are installing a new predator guard on the martin gourd pole and installing a bluebird house in the "dog and wildlife garden" area. Jill and Bob Harper are donating a martin gourd pole and gourds; we may set this up in Harriman Circle. We plan to replace the stolen sundial in the Bellamy Garden in Chittenden Park. This year we will continue the removal of Chinese tallow trees and mimosa trees from McCord Park. This is a slow process, but one that must be dealt with regularly. We will also plan another Arbor Day event and hope to see you there. It is always a good time, working with friends and neighbors.

## Bill and Marge Mansfield Writer's Fund Report

The Bill and Marge Mansfield Writer's Fund supports Leon students with writing talent and a commitment to journalism. We had two winners this past year, Kyle Muller, who served as the newspaper Editor, and Kathryn Haley, the newspaper Business Manager. The Leon journalism teacher selects the award winner based on the student's diligent efforts in journalism, serving as a key worker for either the student newspaper or student yearbook (the yearbook at Leon includes stories as well as pictures,) and being one who may not receive other scholarships for college work. The winners each received a \$250 scholarship from BHNA.

The fund honors the memory of long-time Betton Hills residents Bill and Marge Mansfield. Bill was a working journalist for much of his life and was committed to helping new journalists find their "voice." Bill came to Tallahassee in 1965, serving as Bureau Chief for the *Miami Herald*.

He worked as the Editorial Page Editor for the *Tallahassee Democrat* in the 1980's and 90's. Bill wrote and spoke publicly on education, the environment, integration, and many other issues of local interest.

After his retirement in 1995, and until his death in 2000, Bill devoted his time and talents to volunteering his services to a number of worthy causes, one of which was the BHNA. Bill was our newsletter editor and a respected voice on our Board of Directors.

Bill would be the first to say that Marge contributed a great deal to his success. She was a fine thinker, didn't hesitate to voice her opinions, and had a great desire to see each person in our society treated fairly. As a BHNA board member she was particularly active in our events organized to get neighbors to know one another better. Marge died in 2005.

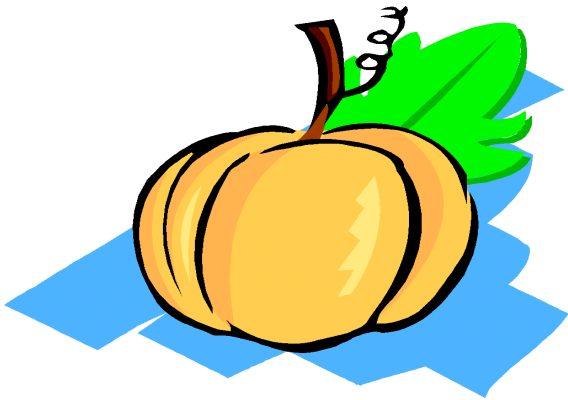

The purpose of this group is to promote home-grown foods--vegetables, fruits, herbs--in whatever manner works for each individual, whether it is growing tomatoes, peppers, and eggplants in pots on the porch or patio, a raised bed vegetable garden, or a community/cooperative garden. In attendance were people from all over town and from Lake Talquin and near Monticello, from young to old, from novice to Master Gardener. ## Betton Hills--We're #1 and Still Saving!

At the end of this past spring, 23 residents in Betton Hills registered to participate in the Council of Neighborhood Associations (CONA) Neighborhood Energy Challenge. This is a program designed to encourage neighborhoods to "out do" each other in reducing their energy use over a three month time period. The measure was kilowatts used in 2009 compared to 2008 for the same three months. The results released at the end of August for month two of the program placed Betton Hills at the top of the list for cumulative energy reduction and first for percentage energy reduction. Considering the high number of neighborhoods participating, including Lafayette Park and Waverly Hills, this is very impressive. Thanks to those in Betton Hills participating and leading the neighborhoods in energy reduction. **"Our front yard fountain is totally off the grid." "We have a vegetable garden, reducing the need for imported fruits and veggies." "We put in guttering and rainbarrels, no longer using City water in our yard." "I always turn off lights when I leave a room." "Fans only!! Very little use of A/C." "I only use gas burners and the microwave for food preparation." "The kids moved out! :-)" "I turn off lights." "We pick up and make use of other people's pine straw and leaf/grass waste before the City truck comes." "Weather permitting, I hang all laundry on the line." "We have a hybrid car." "I walk and bike for as many errands as possible." "We use half-full water glasses for watering house plants." "I bike to work." "We take advantage of City rebates for efficient replacement of appliances." "We carpool our kids to school and sports practices." "We reduce what we send to the landfill by composting." "We have mulch piles and no yard waste." "We converted all our windows to argon low e moderns." "All our lunches are packed in reuseable containers." "I had a free energy audit and increased my insulation."**

## *Hummingbirds in the Autumn Garden*

"When should I take my hummingbird feeder down?" I am asked this question every autumn. The questioner is usually concerned that she will keep "her" hummingbirds here too long, disrupting their natural pattern of migration.

The Ruby-throated Hummingbird, the only species of hummingbird that nests here, migrates to Central America each fall. The ones that nested in Tallahassee will migrate soon, but so will birds that nested farther north. There is a succession of birds passing through that may stop at your plants and feeders in the fall.

Most ornithologists and hummingbird researchers that I have talked to assure me that hummingbirds will migrate without your feeder and plants. However, those plants and feeders are a valuable source of energy for the diminutive birds stocking up for their long trip to Central America each year.

So my answer to the above question is to leave your feeder up until you notice that no birds are using it. Of course, this means cleaning it regularly. My advice for those who want to see hummingbirds up close is to plant lots of nectar-rich plants for them.

Cardinal guard, also known as firespke, is one of the best perennials for attracting hummingbirds in late summer and autumn. It is in full bloom by September, sporting abundant red tubular flowers loaded with nectar. Cardinal guard prefers a lightly shaded spot. We planted ours on the north side of the house near a window and another at the end of our front porch, so we can watch hummingbirds up close from our rocking chairs. Other good hummingbird plants in our yard that continue to bloom into autumn are shrimp plant, *Salvia guaranitica*, red pentas, firebush, Mexican sunflower, cigarette plant, pineapple sage, and ironweed.

Other excellent choices are lantana, butterfly bush, hummingbird plant (*Dicliptera*), cigar plant, false gloxinia (*Sinningia*) and all salvias.

Some folks in Tallahassee leave their feeders up all winter to attract other species of hummingbirds, such as the Rufous Hummingbird, that migrate here from the west and spend the winter feeding on sugar water from feeders, insects, nectar from perennials that overwinter due to recent mild winters, natural winter blooming plants, and sap from sap wells drilled by Yellow-bellied Sapsuckers. If you decide to leave a feeder up over the winter, you will need to clean it regularly, though not as often as a summer feeder.

Does your mailing label look a little odd?  
With this first newsletter of our new year we try to reach all property owners in Betton Hills including new owners and those who did not join our neighborhood association last year. We download the information from the Leon County Property Appraiser, hence the odd format. On future issues, members will receive newsletters with our usual, less institutional labels.
